

MEMORIES TUCKED AWAY:

Now that we live in Arizona much of the year, I miss the seasons as I remember them in Western Kansas. I have always loved the snow, and dearly miss this season.

I remember when we were children attending the one room schoolhouse, we had a great game we played in the snow. It was called "Fox and Geese". We would tramp out a huge wagon wheel in the snow. Then one child was the fox and all the others were geese. The geese would run around the wheel away from the fox, and if you were caught, then you were the fox. We did have some slow geese that couldn't manage to run fast and stay in the path of the wagon wheel, and if they were in your way, you were usually caught. A smart fox always knew who the slow geese were and headed in that direction. It was a fantastic game and we were very rosy cheeked from the exertion and the cold weather when the bell rang for classes to continue.

I remember - Mother also sent the most delicious potato soup in our lunches. She would put the soup in a jar. Then about a hour before lunchtime, we had to put our jars in a pan of hot water on top of the stove (which usually sat in the middle of the classroom.) We then had a nice hot lunch. WHISPER:

ADDRESSES UNKNOWN

Thousands of letters handled by the postal service went undelivered in earlier times. Postmasters were required to publish a list of letters remaining in their office. These lists, appearing in local newspapers, may indicate that an ancestor was once in the town, or intended to be there (but possibly did not arrive). In 1780, the federal post office department included only one Inspector of Dead Letters. However, an 1825 law established "dead letter" offices where skilled clerks tried to discover the correct destinations of wayward correspondence. Women were often hired because it was believed that they had better analytical powers than men and could decipher complicated and confusing addresses. Before a letter became "dead" it must have been unclaimed for three months in the office to which it was sent for delivery, and then, advertised in the newspapers by its address.
